4 REPORT FROM COUNCIL AND COMMITTEES OF COUNCIL

5. THE EVENING'S LECTURE

SOILS: THE LEAST UNDERSTOOD PART OF SCIENCE, YET VITAL FOR ALL OF US Professor Robin J Batterham AO, Kernot Professor of Engineering, University of Melbourne

Emeritus Professor Robert Clancy, Chair of the Events Committee, introduced Professor Batterham a former Chief Scientist of Australia and President of the Academy of Technological Sciences and Engineering, a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Science, the Academy of Technological Sciences and Engineering, and The Royal Academy of Engineering, amongst others. Previously, he has held senior roles in CSIRO and with Rio Tinto, as Global Head of Innovation and Vice-President for Processing Developments. Most recently, he has had leadership roles at the interface of university, industry and government in areas that include mining, mineral processing, and algal and energy systems. Presently, he is the Chair of the Australia-India Strategic Research Fund, the Chair of the Australia-China Strategic Research Fund, the Chair of the International Mineral Processing Council.

A synopsis of the lecture is given below.

The decadal plan for agriculture from our Academy of Science suggests that soils are the least understood part of all science. The lecture explored, if we approach the stewardship of our country differently (and many already are) we can improve our drought resilience, have fewer challenges with run off, use fewer farm chemicals, produce zero emission products such as meat and, if we get it right, sequester around 40% of Australia's emissions. The science to do this is innovative and multifaceted. The lecture ended with an invitation that, whether we live in cities or in the country, we all have a role to play.
